- Bootstrap 5.0 includes some new features and drops some old features. For example, it doesn't include the jumbotron component that was used in the 1st edition.
- Covered in chapter 3.

Hot reload

- We added coverage of this time-saving feature that allows you to make changes to an app and apply them while the app is running.
- Covered in chapter 5.

NFL Teams app

- We simplified this book app to make it easier to follow.
- Covered in chapters 8, 9, and 10.

JsonSerializer class

- We replaced coverage of the Newtonsoft.JSON NuGet package with coverage of the JsonSerializer class of the native System.Text.Json namespace.
- Covered in chapter 9.

Model binding nested complex classes

- We improved our coverage of model binding nested complex classes.
- Covered in chapter 10.

Many-to-many relationships in EF Core 5.0

- We added coverage of coding a many-to-many relationship by convention in EF Core 5.0 because it's much simpler than coding a many-to-many relationships prior to EF Core 5.0.
